

Tips for Reading Together

Children learn best when reading is fun.

- Talk about the title and the pictures on the cover.
- Look through the pictures together and discuss what you think the story might be about.
- Read the story together, inviting your child to read with you.
- Give lots of praise as your child reads with you, and help them when necessary.
- Try different ways of helping if they get stuck on a word. For example: refer to the picture, or read the first sound or syllable of the word, or read the whole sentence. Focus on the meaning.
- Have fun finding the hidden minibeasts.
- Re-read the story later, encouraging your child to read as much of it as they can.

Children enjoy re-reading stories and this helps to build their confidence.



the stump didn’t come up.




Dad called Biff.

“I want you to pull,” said Dad.




Mum and Biff pulled...

but the stump still didn’t come up.




Kipper wanted to help.

“Come on, then,” said Dad.


“When I shout pull... **PULL!**”

but the stump still didn’t come up.




“I’ll pull as well,” said Dad.






Read at Home is designed for young readers. The entertaining stories and humorous illustrations contain built-in progression and vocabulary repetition – which is just what children need to become successful readers!
